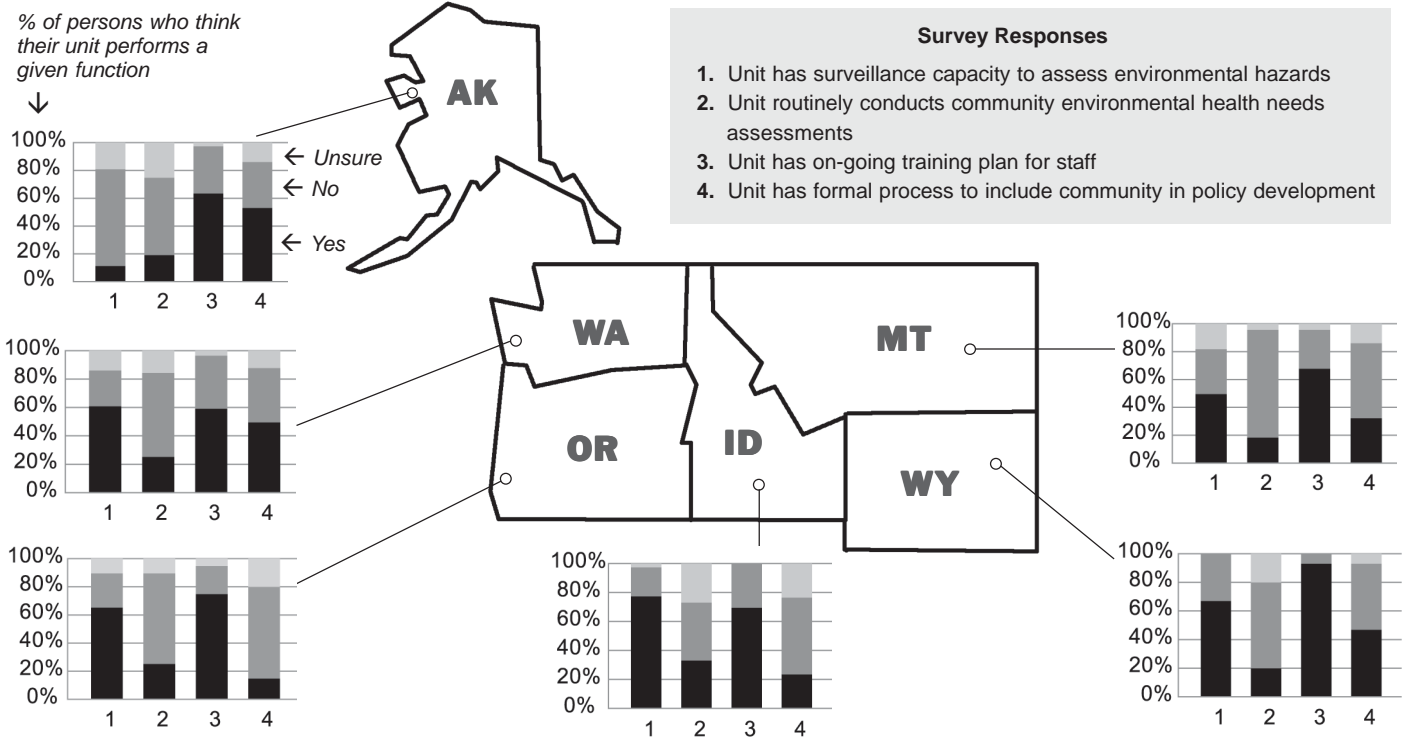


# Northwest Region at a Glance

## Selected Responses to an Environmental Health Workforce Survey on Essential Services
